

Hurricane season runs from Jun. 1 to Nov. 30 with peak mid-August to late October for the Atlantic and Caribbean area.

What To Listen For

HURRICANE WATCH: An announcement that hurricane conditions (sustained winds of 74 mph or higher) are possible within the specified area in association with a tropical, subtropical, or post-tropical cyclone. Because hurricane preparedness activities become difficult once winds reach tropical storm force, the hurricane watch is issued 48 hours in advance of the pated onset of tropicalanticipated onset of tropical-storm-force winds. During a Watch, prepare your home and review your plan for evacuation in case warnings are issued. Listen closely to instructions from local officials. TROPICAL STORM WATCH: An announcement that tropical storm conditions (sustained winds of 39 to 73 mph) are possible within the specified ar-

HURRICANE WARNING: An announcement that hurricane conditions (sustained winds of 74 mph or higher) are expected somewhere within the specified area in association with a tropical, subtropical, or posttropical cyclone. Because hurricane preparedness activities become difficult once winds reach tropical storm force, the hurricane warning is issued 36 hours in advance of the anticistorm-force winds. The warning can remain in effect when dangerously high water or a combination of dangerously high water and waves continue, even though winds

TROPICAL STORM WARN-ING: An announcement that tropical storm conditions (sustained winds of pected somewhere within the specified area within 36 hours in association with a tropical, subtropical, or post-tropical cyclone.

EXTREME WIND WARNING: Extreme sustained winds of a major hurricane (115 mph or greater), usually associated with the eyewall, are expected to begin within an hour. Take immediate shelter in the interior portion of a wellbuilt structure. Additional Watches and Warnings are issued to provide detailed information on specific threats such as floods and tornadoes. Local National Weather Service offices issue Flash Flood/ Flood Watches and Warnings as well as Tornado Warnings

What supplies do you need in case of a Hurricane?



- Water—at least a 3day supply; one gallon per person per day
- Food—at least a 3day supply of nonperishable, easy-toprepare food
- Flashlight
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible)
- Extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Medications (7-day supply) and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, cane)
- Multi-purpose tool

- Sanitation and personal hygiene items
- Copies of personal documents (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, renters insurance



policy, passports, birth certificates, any other insurance policies)

- Cell phone with chargers
- Family and emergency

contact information

- Extra cash
- Emergency blanket
- Map(s) of the area
- Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers)
- Extra set of car keys and house keys
- Extra clothing, hat and sturdy shoes
- Rain gear
- Insect repellent and sunscreen
- Camera for photos of damage


Porches and Patios

The recipient is recommended by the Clearwater For Youth Scholarship Committee and approved by the Board of Trustees. - ⇒ On August 3, 1949, President Harry S. Truman signed a congressional order making June 14th of each year National Flag Day.
- ⇒ Worn out flags may be given to the American Legion or Boy/Girl Scouts of America where they will burn the flags in a formal ceremony on June 14th.
- \Rightarrow The Flag should never touch the ground when being taken down. It should be folded neatly and stored ceremoniously.
- ⇒ You should fly the American Flag only between sunrise and sunset. If left hanging around the clock, it must be illuminated during the dark hours.
- ⇒ The First Flag Act was signed by the Continental Congress on June 14, 1777... Resolved, That the flag of the United States be made of thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation.

- On the Summer Solstice, the North Pole receives 24 hours of daylight, and the South Pole receives 24 hours of darkness.
- Solstice comes from the Latin words for "Sun" and "to stop."
- Many Native American tribes celebrated the Summer Solstice by holding "sundances".
- On the summer solstice, the Earth's axis is tilted the most, up to 26°
